Experience Summary

Mr. Brownlow is a professional archeologist with more than 14 years of cultural resources management experience that ranges from basic archeological field work through comprehensive analysis and report writing for data-recovery projects. Having served 2 years as a research associate at the University of Texas' Texas Archeological Research Laboratory (TARL) and 7.5 years as Horizon's cultural resources director, Mr. Brownlow has amassed an in-depth knowledge of state and federal laws governing the protection of cultural resources, including the Antiquities Code of Texas, Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA), and the Archeological Resources Protection Act (ARPA).
